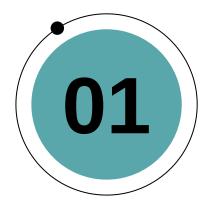

## **Update Summary**



### **Update Summary: Time periods**

- Transfer Policy Review PDP WG Final Report (PDF)
  - Time periods are now reflected in **hours** instead of days (removing the question of business vs calendar days).
  - **720** hour (30 days) mandatory lock period upon **registration** and after **inter-registrar transfer** 
    - This is a reduction of the current 60 day lock period after registration
    - This adds a mandatory lock after transfer that is not in the current Policy.
  - The 120 hour period (5 days) is for provision of the Transfer Authorization Code
    - This is the same period as in the current Policy but in hours instead of days
    - The term "Authinfo Code" has been replaced with "Transfer Authorization Code",
      "TAC" for short.

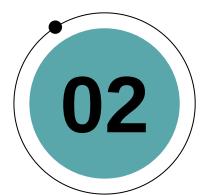
### **Update Summary: Process changes**



The transfer process itself hasn't changed much. Key changes to the process are:

- TAC creation
- Not allowing 'ACK' links to be sent for transfer approval, to help prevent hijacking
- Providing IANA IDs and a link to the IANA list so registrants know where their domain is going/went to
- Mandatory domain lock after transfer for 720 hours

# **Updated Transfer Process**



### **Updated Transfer Process**



When a registrant wants to transfer their domain, the following steps occur:

- 1. The registrant requests the TAC (Transfer Authorization Code)
- 2. Once the request has been submitted, the registrar has up to 120 hours (5 days) to create the TAC and provide it to the registrant.
- 3. Once a TAC has been provisioned, the losing registrar must send a "Notification of TAC Issuance" to the Registrant within 10 minutes

### **Updated Transfer Process**



- 4. Once the transfer has been initiated at the gaining registrar, the registry will notify the losing registrar of the pending transfer and also **provide the IANA ID of the gaining registrar**.
- 5. The losing registrar will then send a "Notice of Transfer Confirmation" to the registrant letting them know that their domain is being transferred.
  - This notice **must include the IANA ID** for the gaining registrar, and
  - MUST NOT include a mechanism for immediately approving the inter-registrar transfer.
  - It should still include a means to cancel the transfer.
  - The registrar may still ACK a transfer, but the option is removed from the notice to the registrant to help prevent domain hijacking

**Bold text** = changes to the existing process

### **Updated Transfer Process**

- 7. Within 24 hours of completion of transfer, the losing registrar must send a "Notification of Transfer Completion". The following elements MUST be included in the "Notification of Transfer Completion":
  - Domain name(s)
  - IANA ID(s) of gaining registrar and link to ICANN-maintained webpage listing accredited registrars and corresponding IANA IDs. If available, the name of the gaining registrar may also be included.
  - Text stating that the domain was transferred
  - Date, time, and time zone that the transfer was completed
  - Instructions detailing how the RNH can contact the losing (prior) registrar for support if they believe the transfer was invalid, and any deadlines or policies which may be relevant.
  - 8. The registrar must lock the domain preventing transfer for 720 hours (30 days) after completion of a transfer.
